Seminar Speakers

Robin Anderson

Robin Anderson has worked in transport research, policy and operations for over thirty years, at all three levels of government. He is currently working as a road safety consultant.

Robin was awarded the 2005 NRMA - ACT Road Safety Trust Churchill Fellowship to study community based road safety programs for older drivers in Europe, USA and Britain - which will be the basis of his talk at this seminar. He is on the executive of the ACT & Region Chapter of the Australasian College of Road Safety and a member of an advisory panel for an ACT Council on the Ageing road safety strategy study.

Val French AM, M.Lit.Std., BA

Val has been president of Older People Speak Out since it began in 1993. Previously senior lecturer and co-designer of the journalism course at QUT, Val has been on the Ministerial Road Safety Advisory Committee since its inception, is on the Seniors Task Force on Crime, the Seniors Sector Roundtable, the Elder Abuse Committee, and the Council of Grandparents. She has also chaired such committees as the Nursing Home Appeals Committee, the first Retirement Village Accreditation Committee and the Ministerial Advisory Council of Older Persons.

Dr Mark King BSc(Hons), MBA, PhD

Mark King joined CARRS-Q in 2004 after working for the Federal, Victorian, South Australian and Queensland governments on road safety research and policy. He has been involved in policy and research on older road users since the mid-1990s, and has served on an OECD committee and two Austroads committees concerned with older road user safety. Recently his research into older road users has focused on the likely impact of demographic change on patterns of crashes, evidence-based actions to address emerging older road user problems, and gaps in knowledge which need to be addressed.

Professor Joanne Wood BSc(Hons), PhD Aston, MCOptom, FFAO

Professor Joanne Wood is from the School of Optometry at QUT and has extensive research experience in a number of key areas. Her research experience, spanning over 20 years, includes a PhD in Visual Sciences at Aston University, UK, followed by a Post Doctoral Fellowship in Clinical Psychophysics at Oxford University. Since 1989 she has been at QUT, initially employed as a Post Doctoral Fellow, and in recognition of her achievements, promoted through Senior Lecturer and Associate Professor to her current position as Professor. Professor Wood has an international reputation for her investigations into the

relationship between vision, ageing and driving performance and has made a significant contribution to understanding how visual impairment affects driving performance, on the factors affecting pedestrian visibility at night-time and on identifying risk factors for unsafe older drivers.

David Foster BEd

Originally trained as a Primary School Teacher, David is currently Road Safety Education Manager for RACQ since relocating to Brisbane from the National Science and Technology Centre in Canberra (Questacon). Previously responsible for Questacon's "The Science Behind Road Safety" program, David is currently developing RACQ's new primary school program, Streets Ahead, as well as adopting the Years Ahead program. The growth in the Years Ahead program over the past 9 months has resulted in the development of a greater range of programs for older drivers.
